New Marquee Sign

The district's marquee sign, located by the tennis courts along Route 111, was purchased in 1996 by A-B Community Ed. It serves as an important tool for sharing district happenings with the community. Twenty-one years later, the sign is in disrepair -- full of wasps in the summer and snow and ice in the winter. It has been repaired numerous times, is leaning precipitously towards Kelly's Corner, and the west-facing side completely fell off several weeks ago as it was being updated. It has become a bit of an eyesore and is cumbersome to update, requiring a staff person to head out in the weather and manually change the message.

Since it was installed, Community Ed. has been the office that has updated the sign and for some time we've been considering a replacement. We are pleased to share that a new, electronic message sign has been ordered and will be installed this summer.

The new marquee is a double-sided LED sign that will be updated remotely using a webbased system. Messages will now be viewable after dark, though the lights will automatically dim so they are not excessively bright. The sign has the ability to show more than one message at a time, with postings rotating at programmed intervals. The cost, including a tasteful brick surround, is \$43,236.25. Community Ed. is purchasing the new sign for the district. The district will incur some additional cost running electricity to the location.

Going forward, oversight of the sign and its operation will turn over to the Superintendent's Office.

#### FOCUS: Social and Emotional Learning (SEL)


This month's *Expanding Our Notion of Success* newsletter focuses on **social and emotional learning (SEL).** 

As defined by the **Collaborative for Academic, Social, and Emotional Learning (CASEL), SEL** is the process through which children and adults acquire and effectively apply the knowledge, attitudes, and skills necessary to understand and manage emotions, set and achieve positive goals, feel and show empathy for others, establish and maintain positive relationships, and make responsible decisions. These six areas are outlined below:



- **Self-awareness:** The ability to accurately recognize one's emotions and thoughts and their influence on behavior. This includes accurately assessing one's strengths and limitations and possessing a well-grounded sense of confidence and optimism.
- Self-management: The ability to regulate one's emotions, thoughts, and behaviors
  effectively in different situations. This includes managing stress, controlling impulses,
  motivating oneself, and setting and working toward achieving personal and academic
  goals.
- Social awareness: The ability to take the perspective of and empathize with others
  from diverse backgrounds and cultures, to understand social and ethical norms for
  behavior, and to recognize family, school, and community resources and supports.
- Relationship skills: The ability to establish and maintain healthy and rewarding
  relationships with diverse individuals and groups. This includes communicating
  clearly, listening actively, cooperating, resisting inappropriate social pressure,
  negotiating conflict constructively, and seeking and offering help when needed.
- Responsible decision making: The ability to make constructive and respectful
  choices about personal behavior and social interactions based on consideration of
  ethical standards, safety concerns, social norms, the realistic evaluation of
  consequences of various actions, and the wellbeing of self and others.



#### **School Notes**

When thinking about protocols for school reform, revising a school's schedule does not often jump to the top of the list. However, we know that a change in schedule can have substantial impact on engagement, teaching, and learning, and we often encourage our partner schools to delve deeply into this issue. There are many different components that comprise a school schedule, but our partners will often consider moving from a traditional 7 period per day schedule to a block or modified block schedule.

After a year of exploring alternate schedules, the Acalanes Union High School District in Northern California (comprised of its four Challenge Success partner schools of Acalanes, Campolindo, Las Lomas, and Miramonte) approved a task force recommendation to switch to a modified block schedule beginning in the 2017-2018 school year. Superintendent John Nickerson explained that the impetus for this change came from "an interest in longer instructional blocks with

opportunities for deeper learning activities, embedding intervention time into the day, and allowing for increased teacher collaboration time. Additionally, there were strong concerns about unhealthy academic stress."

In preparation for this positive change, the district has spent the past year planning for the transition by piloting the new schedule and providing seven additional staff development days to support the instructional change for teachers. This is a significant undertaking, and we applaud the school district for taking the necessary time to include all stakeholders in both the conversation and implementation process. #### Office Hours with Dr. Denise Pope



As you can imagine, I spend a great deal of time reviewing education articles and research. However, last month when I read a piece titled *Class Rankings Deserve Retention*, I did something that I almost never do — I posted a public comment on the article's page. The author's point of view obviously struck a nerve, and I felt compelled to share an alternate perspective. You can read the original article here, and below is my response to the author:

Walt, I respectfully have to disagree with this post. At Challenge Success, a non-profit organization associated with Stanford University Graduate School of Education, www.challengesuccess.org, we work with schools to increase engagement with learning and improve student mental health and well-being. We see a majority of students at high-achieving schools who feel high levels of stress that are associated with sleep deprivation, anxiety, depression, drug abuse, eating disorders, and suicide ideation. We have found that eliminating valedictorian status and class rankings has reduced stress at certain schools — especially those where achievement in the form of grades and test scores and college admission rates is valued above all other traits. Students at these high-achieving schools can be ranked in the bottom quartile even with excellent grade point averages, and consequently feel "dumb" and "less worthy" compared to the majority of their peers. These students not only suffer from stress, but also may become disengaged with school altogether. Other students calculate the exact GPA needed to "beat" their peers for valedictorian status, and may sleep 2-3 hours each night and compromise their health — and sometimes their values (cheating rates are typically high in these kind of schools) in order to win that title. We are not against evaluating students, and we are certainly not against having high standards,

rigorous curricula, and holding students accountable. We don't believe everyone deserves a trophy, but we have seen the problems associated with a ranking system, and have urged schools to consider other ways to honor their top students — ways that rely less on a grade point average and that are more similar to the MVP status on a sports team- where multiple skills and traits are valued.

If you know schools that honor students in creative and healthy ways instead of using rankings and GPA's, let us know. We are always collecting positive examples to share.
